### FG sends old LDS records to Salt Lake for restoration

FOUNTAIN GREEN—Fountain Green LDS Church records that were left in the DUP building have been taken to Salt Lake City for restoration. Mayor Dean Hansen announced it at an Aug. 6 council meeting.

The DUP building was once the sitting office and many church records were left there when the building was turned over to the city.

Records included members' mailing records, sacrament attendance records and other miscellaneous records, but Hansen added that no church event records were present.

Hansen said the records were badly mislabeled where they

touch the walls but restorers have managed to clean them up. The LDS Church will make copies of the records and store them and would keep the originals in a sterile non-deteriorating environment or return them, whichever the city prefers.

Hansen said church officials warned they weren't able to kill the mildew spores which will return once the records are removed from the sterile environment.

After discussion, the council decided that it was their desire to have one original volume returned, which will be placed in an air tight display case and complete copies made of all records and returned to the city.

A motion was passed allowing Carrie Ivory to rent a room in the city hall for her preschool class, at \$50 per month for three days each week.

She will be able to lock the room to protect her equipment, however, the council said she doesn't have exclusive use of the room.

In other business, Mayor Hansen announced the stermatic heater that was in the old fire department has been donated to the LDS Church, who will give it to someone to use. He stated the fire department was going to get rid of it anyway.

Councilperson Mary Gilgen non brought under discussion concerning clearing trees and bushes from city property that blocked a clear view of the roadway.

GUNNSON—A five 1½-week and communication techniques, problem-solving skills, recovery and rehabilitation and self-care around words and stress.

The curriculum has been written by an experienced family member and mental health professional. The course will be taught by Journey of Hope family member volunteers who have taken intensive training as course instructors. Co-teachers for the Sanpete-Sevier area will be Jeffrey D. and Cheryl Anderson.

This course is said to be a wonderful experience balancing basic psychoeducation and skill-training with emotional support, self-care and empowerment. Families with relatives who suffer from serious mental illness are encouraged to take advantage of this unique opportunity.

The course is specifically designed for parents, siblings, spouses, teenage and adult children, and significant others of persons with severe and persistent psychiatric disabilities. However, the course is not appropriate for individuals themselves who suffer from one of the major illnesses.

### NOTICE OF PROPOSED TAX INCREASE

The Sanpete County Water Conservancy is proposing to increase its property tax revenue. As a result of the proposed increase, the tax on a \$90,000 residence will be \$15.64, and the tax on a business having the same value as the average value of a residence in the taxing entity will be \$28.44. Without the proposed increase the tax on a \$90,000 residence would be \$14.11, and the tax on a business having the same value as the average value of a residence in the taxing entity would be \$25.65. The Sanpete County Water Conservancy is proposing to increase its property tax revenue from \$112,634 collected last year to \$129,800 proposed this year, an increase of 15.2%.

The 1997 proposed tax rate is .000316. Without the proposed increase the rate would be .000285.

All concerned citizens are invited to a public hearing on the tax increase to be held on Aug. 28, 1997 at 8 p.m. in the Sanpete County Old Courthouse, 160 N. Main, Manti, UT.
