Dogs can learn to be quiet

**Canine noise pollution is one of the most irritating problems faced by animal control workers. It annoys both dog owners and others of the community. If you think your dog has a problem with barking, here are some tips and information that might help you solve your problem.**

**First, recognize that barking is a very natural and normal behavior for dogs. Barking is a form of communication with other canines and with their pack. It isn't desirable to try to stop all barking, just the barking that annoys or causes problems. This usually means barking continuously when left alone in the house or outside or barking without stopping for more than a reasonable period of time.**

**Dogs that bark continuously are ones that have a behavior problem. These behavior problems are due to being left alone for long periods of time. boredom. Frustration, as well as being frightened.**

**Dogs may also bark because the owner inadvertently trained them to do so. For example, if I thought it would be great to teach my dog to howl. Now whenever I sing a song he howls. I never thought my dog howled. This becomes very inappropriate, especially at 3 a.m.**

**If every time the dog "ruff," "ruff," "ruff" you get up and let him out to bark in his yard, the dog soon learns the value of barking to get what he wants.**

**So how do you train your dog not to bark but still have a good watchdog? Start by praising your dog for being quiet. You often forget to praise his important watchdog behavior. But you must do it repeatedly. Dog obedience instructors recommend rewarding dogs for appropriate behavior in this case. Being quiet! It takes more often than we remember for barking to stop. The basic training sequence for stopping extended periods of barking involves simple steps. First, allow the dog three to five weeks. Come and investigate why the dog is barking. After all, it's just doing the job of alerting you to someone or something dangerous.**
